

Marrow Madness: Village Gardeners Battle for Giant Glory

It was standing-room only in the village hall last Friday as residents of Stubton and surrounding villages gathered for the annual Giant Marrow Growing Competition, a tradition that has run for 2 years now and shows no sign of shrinking - just like the marrows themselves.

The air was thick with anticipation (and a faint whiff of manure) as competitors wheeled in their vegetable behemoths, each one larger, lumpier, and greener than the last. Measuring tapes were drawn, scales were calibrated, and an eager crowd pressed forward to glimpse what promised to be the biggest battle yet.

This year's champions were none other than Lindsay and Sarah Critchley whose marrow tipped the scales at just under a staggering 90 pounds - breaking both last year's record and, very nearly, the judging table. The Critchley's attributed their success to "a lot of cow muck, daily pep talks, and keeping the slugs at bay."

Runner-up, Mike Libby, whose marrow was a mere 81.5 pounds, remained gracious in defeat. "It's not about size," he said with a smile. "It's about community spirit. Though next year, I'll try feeding mine with Guinness."

Attendees made several suggestions for next years challenge from "Guess the Girth" to marrow rolling races, community making of marrow chutney, marrow cake, and even a rather adventurous marrow wine and a competition to identify 'the funniest thing to do with a giant marrow' - to name but a few.

There were also some not so helpful suggestions!

Mike Libby, who presided over the weigh-in, declared: "From a tiny seed to a 90lb marrow - truly amazing - the Lord works in mysterious ways, but in and around Stubton, He clearly has a fondness for oversized vegetables."

As the evening wound down, villagers agreed the event was a resounding success. Whether competing, cheering, or simply having a drink with friends, everyone left with a smile - and in most cases, the offer of a significant amount of marrow. Next year's competition promises to be even bigger and, if the mutterings of secret compost recipes are anything to go by, Stubton may soon need a bigger hall.



Kathleen's Kitchen

Variations on a theme

How about changing the potato toppings on cottage pies & fish pies etc? Try making Bolognaise into pie, instead of serving it with pasta?

All weights & measures are approximate & to cover a medium sized oven/pie dish

Cauliflower Topping

10oz/300g cauliflower, 1-2oz/40g of coarsely grated any hard cheese 3 tbsp of breadcrumbs

Salt & pepper, Olive Oil to drizzle

Roughly chop cauliflower & blitz briefly (don't overdo it, you need it to be crumbly not mush). Combine with the cheese, breadcrumbs & season. Once you have your pie is assembled with your sauce over it, then cover with the Topping (don't press it down hard) & drizzle the oil over the top. Cook at your usual temperature for 20 to 30 mins & be careful not to burn.

Oat topping

10oz/300g of rolled oats,

5-6oz/155g cheese (cheddar - strength to suit you), grated half a tsp salt,

2-3oz/60g of butter or fat to suit, quarter of a pint/135ml water

Put the oats, salt & 4oz/85g of the cheese into a bowl & stir to distribute the cheese. Add the fat & water to a pan. Gently heat the water until the fat has melted. Pour the liquid into the dry mixture & stir well & bring together to form a dough. This can be cut into oatcakes to cover, or use it like a pastry & roll it to cover your dish. Once your pie is covered, sprinkle remaining cheese over the top. Cook your pie at the usual temperature & keep an eye on it to stop it burning.

Farmyard Tails

At the time of writing this, autumn has definitely arrived with plenty of welcome rain. Some of the cows are still eating this years haylage but the grass has started to grow and a bale is lasting much longer. It has however, left our supplies short for this winter. We have managed to buy some hay from a local farmer and it is lovely stuff. It will be nice having some hay in store as the younger calves and lambs struggle a little bit to eat haylage. They find it a little bit chewy.

The Melton breeding Ram sale looms and our ram Sidney is looking forward to retirement. We use a Charollais ram on our North country mule ewes as it gives the lamb a nice slender head. This is important when it comes to lambing as they then need little if any assistance to birth them.

Sidney will keep the new ram company until it is time to go to work. When two males are put together they fight, they do this by both reversing away from each other then charge at full speed with their heads down. The impending 'thud' as their heads meet is not very nice. If you have a bigger and stronger ram they can actually kill the smaller one. To stop this we put them in a small pen for a few days so they don't have too much space to back up. They will still have a go but usually nothing too serious. Once they've settled down they will get a bigger pen to live in until needed.

Life on a farm always goes full circle and once again our thoughts turn to scanning the (hopefully) pregnant cows, getting the ewes ready for breeding and weaning this years calves and lambs. It remains to be seen if the very hot weather affected Ragnors performance which if it did, will result in later calving. This is why we need to scan them to get a rough idea who will calve and when. We always calve inside (unless we get caught out which does happen)we have pens set up with cameras on them so we can keep an eye on them all the time which makes life a whole lot easier. When they start to calve we discretely go into the shed incase assistance is needed.

The calves sold this year that were born last year have gone far and wide with two heading off to the Isle of Wight in a very posh lorry this morning. We tend to hang on to them over winter as not everyone has a barn and when they are young they grow much better if all their energy goes into growing rather than trying to keep

warm outside.



The average age of a UK farmer is 59yrs old. 35-40% of farmers in the UK are now 65yrs and older and only 2-3% of our farmers are under 35yrs old.

British farming is facing a lot of uncertainty and very challenging times. As such I'd like you to consider buying British produce whenever you can.

It was surreal. The children played along with other holiday makers, whilst up in the sky and far out to sea we could see the frantic search going on. I wondered how many adults, like me, were silently praying for the lost child. We were all trying to give the emergency services space.

The boy who had drowned was called George; a 13year old belonging to a family out for a fun day at the seaside. Nearly £10,000 has been raised for the family since this tragedy. Just one of a number this year.

Between 24th October – 2nd November the PTA Scarecrow theme is called "Heroes and Villains". My heroes this year are all those amazing volunteers and service people who worked so hard to look for George.

My scarecrow this year will be wearing a wetsuit and a life jacket – just a way of saying Thank You to the voluntary heroes who help us when we are in trouble.
