



As the nights draw in our hearts are drawn again to that festive highlight: Christmas.

The Christmas story is woven deeply into the history and identity of our British Isles. Our traditions — carols sung together, feasting, generous giving — all echo the messageof the Christ child: "Peaceon earth, goodwill to all." It is remarkable how this faith, kindled so many years ago, became part of the fabric of our national identity.



Christmas and Christianity are full of symbols. And one symbol, the cross, has been painted up and down our country in the form of the St George and Union flags. How does nationalistic vandalism attach itself to a symbol of Christ's radical invitation into God's Kingdom? The St George flag connects us to the ancient and foreign lands of our brother in Christ, St George, despite him being from what is now modern-day Türkiye. We share a Christian heritage, one way or another. According to the census, around 60% of people locally identify as Christian. Exciting News - We are expanding in 2026.



Farmyard Tails

Last month was the Breeding ram sale at Melton Mowbray. The rams are all penned up in groups. Some breeders only have a couple in one pen and other breeders have 6 or 8 in a couple of pens. They are bedded down on lots of lovely straw and the breeders details are on banners and signs on the pens. Each ram has a number tied around his neck. We head off to the office to get a bidding number and a brochure which lists all of the entries including information about the breeder, where they are from and If purely grass fed- this is important as if they've been fed on a lot of concentrated food they will loose condition if you don't feed them when they are tupping (breeding with the ladies) we tend not to feed the ram when he is with the ewes as they steal all of his food. You can tell if he is grass fed by looking at the poo in the pen!

Also listed in the brochure are what treatments he has had. Footvax, for example is given to protect their hooves from infection. Heptavac, I have spoken about before. It's important he is up to date with his boosters.

So, armed with the brochure we go around all of the pens. I go for looks and John being more sensible than me goes for good teeth, strong legs and a good frame (similar to the attributes of myself really) Anyway, when we have narrowed our list down John will go in the pen and check out the three T's. Teeth, Toes and Testicles

We narrow the list even further and choose 1st, 2nd & 3rd. Sometimes your first choice can be late on after your others have been sold then you have to buy him irrespective of his price. Our 1st choice was ram no.6 so not too bad. very handsome Charollais ram. Nearly 2 years old and ready to go to the ladies late November.



We got him home and put him in a pen away from the other sheep to quarantine him. He was given a dose of wormer and a small bowl of sheep pellets to help him settle down.

He has had a handful of pellets everyday since with hay and a small amount of haylage to maintain



his weight prior to him going out. He is now very quiet, loves a scratch and the occasional piece of fruit. His name is Barry (Ram-alow).

The other day we noticed a young barn owl in the hedge by one of the owl boxes. It still had its downy baby feathers and could not fly very well. We rang our owl man and he said it would be a late hatched one and was obviously hungry. It had come out of the owl box in search of food and could not fly well enough to get back in. He suggested we catch it and put it back in the box....easier said than done! After a while and some choice words we cornered it and returned it to the box. Upon Alan's advice we fed it pigeon breast meat with feathers still on. We have been placing these in the box every day now for a few weeks and he/she has feathered up quite nicely. We will reduce the food to encourage it to hunt - fingers crossed.



Kathleen's Kitchen

Not everyone likes Christmas Pudding, so how about making an easy trifle. It can be as simple or as exotic as you like!



Cranberry, **Lemon & Mandarin Trifle** (or just use Raspberry Jam!)

(All weights & measures are approximate - for 6-8 depending on the size of the dish & amounts used)

Ingredients:

2 Lemon cakes - can be any, even Lemon Drizzle!

2 Tins of Mandarin Oranges (drained, reserve juice & a few [pieces to decorate) 2 Jars of Cranberry Sauce (if not cranberries, use seedless Raspberry Jam) A large tub of good Vanilla Custard, or 2 tins of the Ambrosia Deluxe Custard Large Double Cream - some to be whipped for soft peaks & the rest for pouring **Method:**

Cut the cake into slices, not too thick if you would like a 2nd layer. Sprinkle a little bit of the juice from the mandarins over the sponge, but not to make it soggy.

Then spread the sauce or jam over the spong5e & put a layer of mandarins on top. Put a thin layer of custard over the mandarins & repeat the layers. If only one layer wanted, then make the layers thicker.

Whip some cream until it stands in soft peaks & top the trifle. Decorate with come mandarins & chocolate if you want.

It can be made a day or two ahead of when required.

Note: this trifle can be adapted in many ways, by using different cakes & fruit.

We have agreed to support the Women's Refuge all year round, not just at Christmas.



HISTORY OF LINCOLN

From the first century BC, the first known settlers in Lincoln lived around the Brayford Waterfront. The area was originally known as Lindon - the word 'lindo' translating as 'the pool' in the Celtic language.



Excavations around the Brayford have uncovered timber houses, weapons and pottery dating back to the first century AD. In 1862 the Witham Shield was found in the River Witham, a decorative bronze shield dating back to the 4th century, which is thought to have belonged to a tribal chief.

In 43AD, the Roman Emperor Claudius, with an army of 40,000 troops, invaded Britain. Between 50-60AD, the Ninth Legion Hispana arrived in Lincoln. The Romans built a legionary fortress at the top of the hill, which was surrounded by a deep ditch and a wall. Wooden towers were positioned at intervals along the wall, and there were four gateways. During this time Ermine Street was constructed to link London with York, passing through Lincoln which was now a site of military importance.

The Roman settlement at Lindon became a Colonia - a self governing town for retired legionaries, and the original name of Lindon was Latinised to become Lindum Colonia. It was now a bustling city, with law courts, civic offices, markets and workshops. Lindum Colonia expanded down the hill and the River Witham became a busy port. During the 2nd century the original wooden walls and gates were rebuilt in stone - many of which are still standing today.

When the Romans left Britain in 407AD the settlement at Lindum Colonia was abandoned until the Danes conquered the area in the late 9th century, re-establishing a town within the old city walls.



In Viking times Lincoln became an important trading centre. The city issued coins from its own mint and the local economy boomed. Lincolnshire was the heart of the Viking Danelaw, and its Danish inheritance can still be seen in town names ending -by (Wragby, Spilsby, Grimsby) and streets ending in -gate (Bailgate, Eastgate).

By the time of the Norman Conquest in 1066, Lincoln was flourishing. In 1068 William the Conqueror ordered the building of the castle and city walls, initially in wood, but they were rebuilt in stone in the 12th century. On the orders of the King, Bishop Remigius began the building of the first cathedral in Lincoln in 1072, and it was consecrated in 1092. When the Domesday survey was commissioned by William in 1086, Lincolnshire was listed as the 2nd most populated county in the kingdom, and Lincoln was one of the four largest cities.



In 1215, when King John placed his seal on Magna Carta, a copy was brought back to Lincoln by the Bishop, Hugh of Wells, with the address 'Lincolnia' written on the back.

By 1300 Lincoln cathedral had become the tallest building in the known world, a title it held until 1549 when the spire collapsed during a storm.

Throughout the 17th -19th centuries Lincoln was a wealthy city, supported by a thriving wool trade. With the coming of the Industrial Revolution in the early 19th century

Lincoln boomed, particularly in the engineering industry.

In 1916 the first ever tanks were designed and built in Lincoln, and the city was also at the centre of the aviation industry, with 1 in 14 WW1 aircraft being produced there. During WW2 Lincolnshire was known as Bomber County due to the large number of RAF bases.





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
