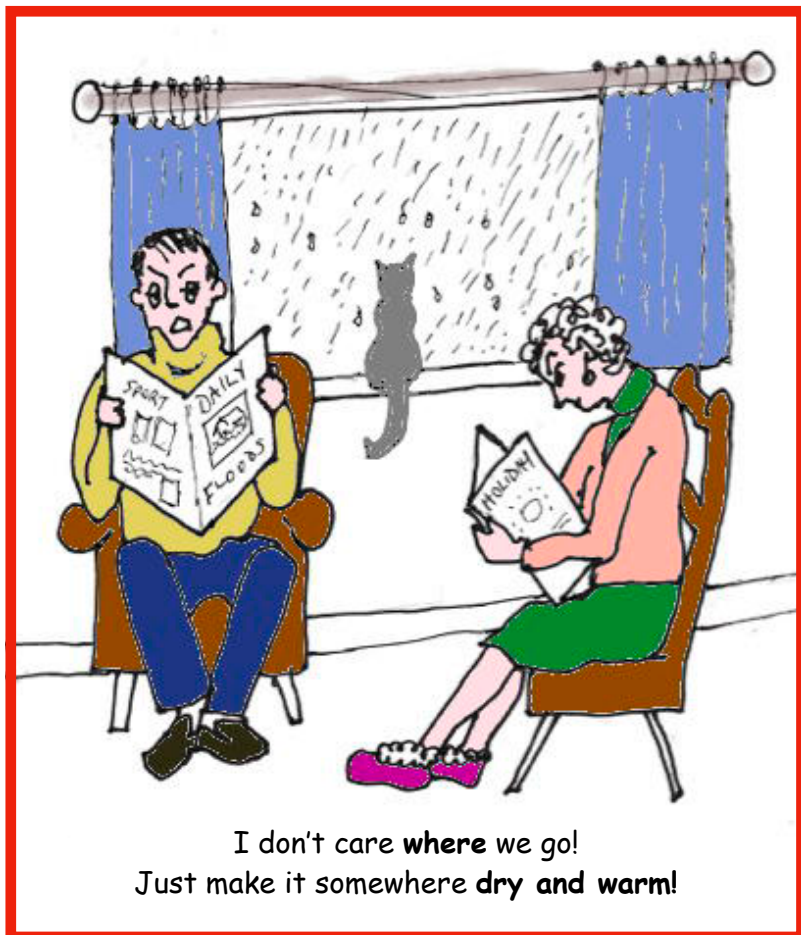

From The Vicarage

This time of year often feels like a threshold. The new year is young, carrying a hope about the possibilities for the next twelve months. The unsettled state of the world is not ignored, but is set within a wider context of possibility. Yet the question remains: where do we place our hope?



The Christian faith has never pretended that life is easy. In the Bible, we meet people who faced disruption, fear, and uncertainty — and who discovered that hope is not found in having all the answers, but in walking together. Even Jesus gathered a community around him: sharing meals, listening deeply, and offering compassion and support to one another. Farmyard Tails

Last year I remember us having a very good dry spring as the cows were turned out very early on. What then followed was a lovely hot albeit dry summer and a beautiful autumn, it therefore follows suit that perhaps a dry cold winter is on the horizon?

From a farming point of view this will have mixed blessings. The good points are it will keep the land firm and the covering of grass good. The overwintering sheep will not tread it up and they will keep cleaner. Barry Ram-alow and his lady's are looking well and we will top them up with hay on the field if there is a deep covering of snow. Sheep are very good at grubbing out the grass through a light covering but not if it is deep. The cattle are all back indoors (the big sheds do have an area outside, the highlands much prefer to be outside whenever possible) The dry air serves them well if they do wander indoors as this is less prone to air borne bugs.

The downside of a cold winter is frozen water pipes that feed the water troughs, frozen water (cattle need water all the time) and slippery floors.

The in-calf cows are doing a little too well. They came in fat and are maintaining their condition well eating the high sugar haylage we produced last summer. We do not want them too fat as they will lay down fat around the pelvis which could hinder calving. That said, our bull Ragnor does produce a nice size calf. When we purchase something as important as a breeding bull we research his EBV values prior to purchase along with his bloodlines to ensure there will be no in-line breeding with the cows he will be serving. EBV stands for estimated breeding values. These are listed in a document and predict the genetic likelihood of various outcomes like the ease of which his calves will be born (meaning he does not produce massive calves) it will predict how well his daughters will milk when they calve themselves and to a certain degree how calm his progeny will be. There are lots of things we can learn from the document about how his progeny will perform. This document is compiled over many years using data from the many calves born to his bloodlines.

Last years heifer calves are now in a pen together and have been weaned off their dams. They are all sold but will not be going to their new homes until the spring. I usually keep them for their first winter. I can ensure they are then well fed and so a good size for turn out in the spring. They will calm down nicely as we go in the pen twice or more a day to feed them and tidy up any mess. Nearer the time they will be halter broken before leaving the farm. This ensures a healthy, calm and happy yearling heifer.

The steers will be heading up to Hellfield soon. They usually go a little earlier but the new owner was short of fodder due to the dry summer last year and he asked if we could hang onto them a little longer. They are still with their dams and as they are still feeding it will help to keep the cows weight in check. The steers are sold by weight so us keeping them a little longer means they will weigh more so whilst they have eaten some of our hay we will get a good return as they will be worth more money.

Last years lambs will be heading to Melton livestock market in a couple of weeks also.

The barn owl who I named Beryl (but could have been a Brian!) fed for a few weeks longer. I reduced the pigeon fillets to one a day and then when she started to miss her meals I eventually stopped. We see her over the back fields by the river and sometimes see her sitting on top of the owl box.

Fingers crossed she makes it through the winter.

Kathleen's Kitchen

Yoghurt Potato Bake.

(All weights & measures are approximate)

For fans of Greek Yoghurt, this may appeal! I make up EasiYo, it's easy to keep in & make up any time.

Ingredients

Butter or oil for greasing

4 Large potatoes - baking potato size (peeled & finely sliced)

25g/1oz salted butter cut into small pieces (if using unsalted butter, then you may want to add a little sprinkle of salt).

Greek Yoghurt - full fat (light will alter the taste & texture) approximately 3 quarters of a large tub or half of an EasiYo tub.

Double cream (small pot)

Freshly ground black pepper

Parmesan cheese 4tbsp or any other cheese you would prefer.

Method

Preheat the oven to 180c & grease a large shallow ovenproof dish.

Dry the potato slices thoroughly & layer them in a dish & dot a bit of butter between each layer.

Whisk together the yoghurt & cream & pour over the potatoes.

Sprinkle with pepper & grated cheese, then bake in the oven for 45 mins or until tender & golden.

Serve immediately.

Note:

this recipe can be adapted by using any leftover cooked vegetables in a layer & use a bigger dish & more yoghurt if necessary.

Any herbs or spices can be added if you want to have a change of taste.

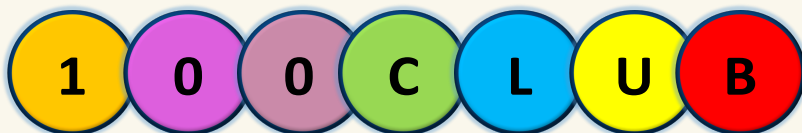
