

### Letter from your Editor



### Hello!

We have never known such a long dry spell as we are having at the time of writing, although by the time you see this, it will probably be a monsoon! The Witham is slow and clear and you can see the brown trout and other things swimming lazily around. I can't identify fish like I can with birds and wild flowers, I'm afraid.

I have left the cow parsley again to grow over two foot high in the orchard and I hope the pheasants are again raising their chicks in there. Last year the most I counted were 12 in one brood. Some years ago I had a melanistic cock pheasant - he appeared jet black over his back and wings until the sun caught him and the iridescence shone out. That trait seems to have bred out of the current birds but two years ago I got one that had a back that was bone coloured as if he had no pigment at all.

In this edition you will see that Laurice is trying to identify and encourage us to spot and record swifts in our villages. They are such wonderful birds to watch in flight. I also am saddened that martins no longer nest at my house. They always used to, but so many birds have lost nesting sites and food supplies...

There are lots of fetes and parties going on, and plenty of opportunity to meet and natter at the various coffee mornings. It is good that the Co-op are supporting community efforts like these.

As always I would like to thank the tireless volunteers in all our villages who give up time and much effort to keep things going and raising money for good causes along the way. We have to be so self reliant in rural areas and I am very proud of all that we all achieve!





### Kathleen's Kitchen

### Fresh Mango Salsa

(All measures are approximate)

### Ingredients:

1 ripe <u>mango</u>, finely chopped

Half a red pepper finely chopped

Half of small sweet white onion (is the best) or 1-2 shallots or a small amount of red onion, whichever is used must be finely chopped

- 1-2 <u>limes</u>, juiced & zest (optional), lemon can be used, but will change the flavour Pinch <u>salt</u>
- 1-2 tbs fresh rosemary finely chopped, or herb of your choice.

#### Method:

Mix all ingredients well.& chill until needed. Will keep for 2-3 days in the fridge.

**Note**: it goes well with a cheeseboard, which is what I made it for, but it can be put with BBQs, salads & many other dishes.

### **Farmyard Tails**

The lack of rain is very worrying for farmers and growers alike now with crops already showing signs of distress. We are running short of grass, partly due to an early turnout and partly due to the lack of rain which has halted the grass growth.

We have delayed turning out the 3yr olds with Ragnor as there are already quite a few on that field with him. We need to conserve the grass as the cows with calves at foot are on there and as I mentioned before it is paramount that they get the best grazing.

The young stock and Carol are over the other side of the farm (away from the bull) they were getting short of grass so we have put a large ring feeder in the field with them in which we place a large bale of last years hay every few days. This is sufficient to keep them well. They also have a feed block with them which is packed full of vitamins and minerals. The feeder will be removed along with any remaining hay when the grass starts to grow again.

The dry spring will inevitably have a knock on effect with how much hay we will get at harvest. The cutting crop is usually twice as high as it is at the moment. If hay runs short then the price will shoot up for anyone needing to buy any for their stock. We need to make sure the hay barn is full to the rafters in preparation for winter when they are all in barns and dependent upon it.

A few of the older cows needed a hoof trim before being turned out with Ragnor and Carol was pregnancy scanned to check everything was progressing how it should be. She is due to calve around July 22nd.

With the high temperatures of mid May came the need to offer the cows and calves some shade. We do this by bringing them into a large and airy barn during the day. When it cools down they all wander back onto their grazing field. Unlike many other mammals cows have very few sweat glands in their skin as such it makes it difficult for them to cool down. Cows primarily use their noses to expel heat and this regulates their body temperature.

The wetness on a cows nose, particularly in hot weather is often a sign of this nasal exhalation and cooling process. Seeking shade, drinking lots of water and reducing activity also helps.

At the time of writing this there are only 9 ewes left to lamb. Most have had twins which is ideal with them only having 2 teats.

The sheep are still very woolly and as such they too needed to have use of a barn for shade during the day. The ewes and lambs have a paddock with shade so they were able to stay out. The ewes have been sprayed with an anti-fly solution to protect them from blowfly strike. This is where the adult fly lays eggs in the fleece of the sheep. The eggs hatch out and the maggots cause great distress and potential death if not addressed. Our sheep shearer has got us booked in for mid June after which we will not need to worry as the blowfly favours long fleeces

and hot and humid conditions.

### S O S - Save our swifts!

### Can you help?

According to local knowledge, generations of swifts have been coming to Claypole to rear their young for over 60 years. Unfortunately, their numbers are diminishing as they struggle to find suitable places to nest.

They nest in the roof eaves of buildings, just under the tiles. Some of these sites have already inadvertently been lost during repair or replacement of roofs.

To help support and maintain future generations of swifts visiting our village **it would** be helpful for us to know how many existing pairs of swifts are left and whereabouts they are. With this information and by creating awareness, we can help support maintaining a future for the swifts migrating to our village.

#### Fascinating information and facts about these remarkable birds:

In flight they look like a curved black boomerang shape and fly very fast. – up to 69 mph on the level

They are migrant birds – travelling roughly a 14,000-mile round trip from Africa to nest in the UK, arriving around May and leaving by the end of August.

Swifts feed on insects, mate, and sleep on the wing. They have short legs and the only time they land is when they return to the UK to nest.

Lifespan – 4 to 9 years (approximately) but they don't reach full maturity until 3 years, so preserving a breeding colony is vitally important for their future.

They make excellent house guests: they are quiet when nesting; don't make or leave a mess and give hours of entertainment when watching their acrobatic flights!

### Please help us by letting us know the following:

Do you already have swifts nesting – if so how many?

Do you already have swift bricks or swift boxes in place?

Would you be prepared to put up swift boxes in the future?
