From the Vicarage

Eighty years ago, on 11 November 1945, the world marked its first Armistice Day after the end of the Second World War. The guns had finally fallen silent, yet across Europe and beyond, the scars of conflict were everywhere — in cities reduced to rubble, in families grieving their dead, and in hearts weary of hatred and loss. It was a moment of fragile



hope: could humanity learn a new way to live together after such devastation?

The prophet Isaiah, writing more than 2,500 years earlier, imagined a world transformed by peace: "They shall beat their swords into ploughshares, and their spears into pruning hooks." (Isaiah 2:4) These words were spoken to a people living amid fear and violence, surrounded by powerful nations and constant threat. Isaiah's vision was not naïve optimism but a radical reimagining of what humanity could become — choosing to turn the very tools of destruction into instruments for nurturing life.

That same challenge faces us today. In recent weeks, the Gaza peace agreement has offered a glimmer of hope after so much suffering and bitterness. We hope and pray for all other wars to be brought to their speedy and lasting conclusion. Peace, if it is to last, cannot be simply the absence of war. It must grow in hearts willing to see former enemies as neighbours, and to rebuild what has been broken — homes, communities, and trust.

As we pause this month to remember those who gave their lives in war, may we also commit ourselves to Isaiah's vision. Each of us has the power to choose whether the tools in our hands — our words, our resources, our influence — will wound or heal. May we use them to wage peace, build understanding, and nurture life, so that future generations might truly inherit a world where swords have become ploughshares.



Farmyard Tails

Something a little different to start with this month. Swans & Cygnets. We have the River Witham running around part of the farm and for the 2 plus years that we have been here we have had a pair of swans on the river that have successfully raised their cygnets. I will admit apart from a little general knowledge I did not really know very much about them so when I found a cygnet with our own geese on the yard the other day I looked into their life a bit more. The Cygnet was quite happy plodding around with our Toulouse geese but I was well aware that it really did need to get back onto a watercourse. We contacted our local swan rescue centre and a very helpful gentleman told us that at this time of year the cygnets are booted off the nest and need to find territory of their own. In fact the adults can be quite nasty if the cygnet does not take heed and move away. If the cygnet did not leave our farm soon our local rescue lady would come and 'lift' the cygnet and find it a suitable watercourse to live on away from any adults. It did however fly off of its own accord the day after.

Young swans typically do not breed until they are two or even three years old. Pairs usually mate for life and will return each year to the same nesting site. Eggs are laid in late April through to late May. The female will lay 4-7 eggs typically. Incubation is approx 33 days. They usually leave their parent's territory for good by late autumn to join other juvenile swans which then seek out safe areas to overwinter.

An adult male swan is called a cob and an adult female is called a pen.

Some of you that have been reading my page since the beginning may remember a calf called 'Dennis'. A lady contacted me back in the summer asking for a couple of very quiet highland youngsters. Dennis and his half-sister Saffron came to mind. They were both late born and overwintered together last year. Dennis is a castrated and de-horned male (steer) and unbelievably quiet as is Saffi. The lady in question runs a farm called 'Time to grow' they "use the natural world and farming practices to help educate children and improve their mental health and wellbeing". So Saffi and Dennis were brought into the barn and halter broken. We do this by putting a halter on them during the day and let them drag it around for a few days. It gets them used to having something on their face and when they stand on the rope it stops them from moving which has the same effect as us using the rope to stop them. Having an animal halter trained quietens them down and makes it easier to handle them. Like a horse, you can then go into a field, slip a halter on them and walk them out rather than having to try and get them all in a barn and separate the one animal out that you want. We then start walking them around the yard which can be a bit of an ordeal if the animal try's to run off. Doing this everyday soon gets them used to it however.

When collection day arrived they were walked into the trailer and after exchanging passport and pedigree papers they headed off to Bromsgrove. Within 48 hours her own children were brushing them and they had settled into their new home very quickly. It's always very sad when my animals move onto pastures new but in this case I knew they would get so much love and time spent on them from the visiting children.

Kathleen's Kitchen

Puff Pastry Sweetmeats

Ingredients:

Puff Pastry (bought block or sheets).

White Marzipan - optional (White is natural & the yellow has added colouring).

Fruit - berries, apples (eating, cored & sliced), jam (any), cranberry or apple sauce (must be a thick consistency).

Egg (beaten with a little milk if preferred), to stick Pastry & to brush over the pastry for a glossy colour.

Method:

Marzipan Log - After the pastry has been rolled out thinly, roll marzipan into a sausage shape & put on the pastry as if you were making a sausage roll. Either keep it as a long roll or or cut into small rolls. Bake at 200°c for 20-30 mins until a golden colour & when cool, sprinkle with a fine dusting of icing sugar. Can be frozen without the icing sugar.

Other pastries either in log shapes or do squares & put fruit (tossed with sugar, if needed) into the centre & pull corners together. Or use any of the items listed, which can be combined with whatever you fancy.

If you roll the log so that it has layers, then the log can be sliced before baking & put on a tray like circles.

Note: Remember to brush edges of any of the pastries & press together. Because ovens can vary, keep an eye on it so that pastries don't burn.

Jane's Virtuous and Easy fat free mincemeat

Make your own mincemeat using windfall apples or those reaching the end of their storage time

As with all my recipes, this is rough and ready, no exact quantities - use what you've got!

Put all the following into a really large casserole that will fit in your oven

2 or 3 lbs apple - any sort, peeled, cored, chopped roughly

2 -3 lbs dried fruit of any sort, e.g. sultanas

Some candied peel can be added to this if wished - I do

4 oz dark Muscovado sugar or dark brown soft suar

1 litre orange juice or apple juice

4 or 5 heaped teaspoons spices of your choice e.g. ginger, cloves, nutmeg, allspice (even cinnamon if you must!)

Method

Mix it all together in your big pot.

Put a lid on and put it in the oven for a couple of hours or so around 180°C Store in airtight jars.

Mincemeat Crumble Slices

(All weights & measures are approximate)

Ingredients:

300g/10-11ozs Self-raising Flour 175g/6-7ozs Butter, cubed and fridge cold 50g Light Brown Muscovado Sugar 1 tsp Mixed Spice

400g Jar of Mincemeat

Method:

Preheat the oven to 180°c (160°fan) and line a 20 x 30cm/7-8inches x 11-12inches baking tin with baking paper.

In a large bowl, rub together the butter and flour until you get a breadcrumb type consistency. Stir in the sugar and mixed spice.

Press half the mixture into the base of the tin and then spread the jar of mincemeat over the top.

Sprinkle the rest of the crumble mixture on top and lightly press down.

Bake for 30-35 minutes. Leave to cool in the tin before cutting into squares.
