From the Vicarage

As the nights draw in our hearts are drawn again to that festive highlight: Christmas.

The Christmas story is woven deeply into the history and identity of our British Isles. Our traditions — carols sung together, feasting, generous giving — all echo the messageof the Christ child: "Peaceon earth, goodwill to all." It is remarkable how this faith, kindled so many years ago, became part of the fabric of our national identity.



Christmas and Christianity are full of symbols. And one symbol, the cross, has been painted up and down our country in the form of the St George and Union flags. How does nationalistic vandalism attach itself to a symbol of Christ's radical invitation into God's Kingdom? Regardlessof intent, these flags remind us that, however we come to share our British identity, unity is at our heart. The Union Flagunites the crossesof our United Kingdom. The St George flag connects us to the ancient and foreign lands of our brother in Christ, St George, despite him being from what is now modern-day Türkiye. These symbols remind us that our national story and our Christian heritage are intertwined, complex, beautiful and expansive.

We share a Christian heritage, one way or another. According to the census, around 60% of people locally identify as Christian. If you are one of them — or simply curious — maybe you've wanted somewhere to explore what your Christian heritage means for you. As well as all the Christmas celebrations, we're making space in January for you to join us for an Alpha Course. for those who want to get a deeper sense of who they are as British, as Christian or the product of a Christian heritage and who they are as a person. We look forward to having you join us.

FOSTONWI

On our 11th November meeting, we were privileged to have Shelagh Coates give us a talk on her uncle. He was John Henry "Harry" Coates, an RAFWarrant Officer and Spitfire pilot who waskilled in action in Italy on March 5, 1945, when his plane was shot down. His body was not recovered until an excavation of the crash site in 2017. "Harry" was a pilot in the 111 Squadron, flying a Spitfire on a mission near Cavarzere, Italy, when his aircraft was hit by flak and exploded, disintegrating over a large area. He was declared missing in action and the first his family knew was when they received a telegram with this information. This was 2 months before V EDay, 80 years ago.

A crashsite was identified by Italian aviation archaeologists in 2017, prompted by an eyewitness account. Excavation revealed human remains along with his pilot's wings and rank insignia. Forensic testing and matching the aircraft's serial number confirmed the identity of the remains as Warrant Officer John Henry Coates. Needing proof an advert was posted, requesting family to come forward.

A full military funeral with honours, was held in March 2019, attended by his family and RAFpersonnel. He was laid to rest, in the PaduaWar Cemetery, Italy, On a plaque it says: The land on which this cemetery stands is the gift of the Italian people for the perpetual resting place of the Sailors, Soldier, Airmen who are honoured here.

This was a very moving and interesting talk, especially on this date.







Pavillion Improvements at Playing Fields

Many of you will be aware of the successof our local village football teams in recent years, but with successcame a requirement for better changing facilities for both teams and officials. The upgrade to the pavilion which has been 2 years in the planning and delivery has seen the creation of 2 enlarged, better-equipped, changing rooms for teams, as well as dedicated changing facilities for match officials and 2 large store rooms; the pavilion now also has improved accessfor the disabled and improvements to the kitchen equipment. The upgraded facilities, although currently in use, will be officially opened in the next few weeks members of the Playing Field Committee and a representative of the Football Foundation that provided grant funding, though the project could not have been completed without the generous financial support received from Mr Geoff Fearn.

Thesepavilion improvements come on the back of additions to the playing field equipment, installed last year, and plans to develop solar power to make savings and potentially generate a small income and to instal on-site facilities to house the playing field tractor. Looking to the future, the Playing Field Committee intends to turn it's attentions to resurfacing multi-use games area.



From Remembrance to Christmas: A Time to Reflect and Respond

It is a real privilege to be able to write in this magazine. As I do so, we are approaching Remembrance, and my thoughts turn both to the past and to the seasons that lie ahead.

It has been wonderful to join a Saturdaycoffee morning recently, and I very much look forward to the time when my diary allows me to attend the monthly puzzleafternoons too. Theseare not just times of friendship and fun; our church is a place where faith is celebrated and where people discover the faith that sustains through life's challenges. It has also been uplifting to see everyone at our Church Council- and to remind ourselves that Long Bennington Methodist Churchis part of a wider circuit of churches who support one another by sharing resources, prayer, and encouragement.

As I write, I am preparing for RemembranceSunday. However, my thoughts are turning toward Christmas. The two seasons are more closely linked than they first appear: both call us to remember, both invite us to look to the future with hope, and both speakinto our world's continuing need for peace.

This year, perhaps more than in recent years, I am mindful of the rise in right wing ideology acrossthe world, often fuelled by unwarranted fear, politicians who seek to capitalise on this, and by disproportionate reporting in the media. In our own country we have seen flags raised in protest against immigration (although in fairness there has never been any coherent messageabout what this stood for - to my mind it reflected more of a mood rather than a message). In this climate, it feels all the more important to remember that JesusChrist, the Light of the World, was himself a refugee and an asylum seeker. Mary and Josephwere forced by the authorities to travel back to Joseph'sfamily home, Bethlehem. They found themselves homeless (families are often complex). They benefited from the goodwill of an innkeeper - who perhaps could have done more - offering the pregnant Mary, and Joseph, the shelter of an outhouse.

Soonafter, when the news of Jesus'birth reached King Herod's, his perception that there might be a threat to his throne gaverise to his waging a campaign of ethnic cleansing- a genocide of innocent male children. Hence, the Holy family fled for their lives. We hear little more of them until Jesusappearsat the temple as a boy, amazingthe teachers with his wisdom. But we can imagine that Joseph'srole in protecting Mary and the child was crucial. His compassion and obedience, often overlooked in the Christmasstory, may well have savedthe family from danger. Similarly, generations before this, we read how Egyptian midwives conspired equally to resist the same order from Pharaohwho felt threatened by an increasing growth in the Hebrew population residing in Egypt.

Sothis Christmas, my prayer is that we might think fully through what Christmasmeans. One that questions the harsh realities of the story, and the attitudes we hold in our hearts. The wonder of Christmasis that Christ comes to us as a child, looking for us to embrace him with love and humility. The question is: how will we respond?

Be protective, like Mary and Joseph, of those who are vulnerable. Be wise, like the Magi, who chosenot to return to Herod, having seen the heart of evil and chosen a different path. And above all, let the light of Christ, the refugee, the Saviour, the hope of the world, guide you to respond with courage, compassion, and love - and change the way you see the world and think about those in greatest need.

With the festive seasononly just round the corner we all become a bit less security conscious so here are a few reminders how to avoid sharing your Christmas funds with the Scammers. Fact: "December is the most successful month for Scammers."

- 1. FakeWebsites.Usethe retailers you are familiar with. Alwayslog directly into their websites or Apps. Don't use links from other websites.
- 2. FakeAppealsfor help. It's great to share a bit with those lessfortunate. Make your donations direct to a known charity or appeal. Checkthe website name when you make a payment. Again, don't click on a link from another website or a link shared on social media.
- 3. Phone snatching has become a significant issue. Keepyour phone safe as Scammer will be happy to "snatch it out of your hand"
- 4. If things don't feel right, askyourself the guestions: "Why?" Rememberthe national campaign:
- · "STOP" Takea moment to stop and think before parting with your money or information.
- · "CHALLENGE" Askyourself, could it be fake? It's ok to reject, refuse or ignore any requests. Only criminals will try to rush or panic you.

 "PROTECT" Contactyour bank immediately if you think you've been scammed.
